In other words, I hope that CAPT will grow into a place of responsible free speech. Adventurous, responsible free speech, that we don't mouth the same thing, but when we say something, be it simple or radical, we say it out of respect. We say it out of good consideration, good facts, and not just championing our position. CAPT will be a learning place where we want to review old things and celebrate them. And also try new things, because it is necessary.

### If you could start an interest group, what would it be?

An eco-concert band - have school kids stay in CAPT for four nights and make music through recycled material - then hold a getai!



#### What is your favourite aspect of CAPT?

I think it is to see students bloom and mature over their two years here. My gut feeling is that at CAPT, we offer many students the opportunity to grow. 
### Wun Chou Hou, Sports Officer


