




## **PARTNERS**

I would definitely wish to see more interns coming to our school and to my class. I have learnt new skills and ideas from them and would love to continue this engagement with them.






### ART CLASSES

There is a need to have more interns like them to come to our school, especially to the Geography, Economics, Development Studies classes, so that our students get to learn different perspectives and more about the world around them. This is important for my students as the Geography, Economics, Development discipline is based on interactions with other people from different countries and societies. Students will get exposure to people from other walks of life, like Singapore. This will help to broaden their perspective and break them out of the conventional education and perspective that they are used to.

# EFFECTIVE LEARNING WORKSHOP

During my internship, I co-facilitated the Effective Learning Workshop for Form 4 and Form 5 students. This group of students was selected for the workshop as the team felt that the note-taking and revision skills would benefit most from it, as the students are preparing for their IGCSE examinations.

At the workshop, we conducted a learning style questionnaire to introduce different types of learners- visual, audio, and kinesthetic- to allow students to understand themselves better. This questionnaire was well received by students as they were able to identify and understand the learning methods that suit them. This allowed students to be more targeted in acquiring knowledge, or when doing their revision. After the questionnaire, we shared about the different note-taking methods and introduced learning aids, such as mind mapping and sequencing events chronologically through the use of a timeline. We gave students examples of how it can be applied to their school work and encouraged them to start making their notes with these tools.

We also conducted a sharing session with the teachers, to share the results of the questionnaire we conducted for the students. We also wanted to highlight the need for teachers to tailor their teaching methods to suit different profiles of learners in the class. This is crucial as teachers are pivotal in encouraging students learning and more can be achieved through their help. I would like to thank DWIS for allowing us to interact with your students and teachers. We have definitely learnt a lot from you and I hope you have learned a little more about us too!




### THANK YOU
